Happy 2025! This is a banner year for the Burlington Public Library as it rings in our 140th year of continuous service as a public library! In 1885 the city of Burlington enacted Ordinance 21, establishing a 'free public 'library', making us the first public library established West of the Mississippi - prior to this, libraries West of the river were subscription libraries requiring annual payments for 'stockholders.' This year marks 140 years of continuous service for the Burlington Public Library, and while our services in 2025 will look radically different than the stacks of our 1885 library, the core tenant of providing access to information for the purpose of self-edification still rings true.

In 2024 we saw over 120,000 people come through our doors for services, which range from traditional book lending to meeting room use, program participation, technology help, and so much more. It takes a community of trained professionals to keep an institution like the Burlington Public Library thriving for 140 years, and your current staff of 27 fabulous individuals is a standout team that regularly goes above and beyond to meet the needs of our community. A big thanks to you as well, for being a part of the BPL community. Year 140 brings some difficult times our way with budget issues. legislative hurdles, and threats to our First Amendment right to read. The best way to support your library is to use it, so I hope to see you around BPL as we start what will be another fabulous year of library service.

Did you know that while our library is a city department, it is governed by a Board of Trustees? Our seven trustees are appointed by the mayor and approved by city council. They hire and oversee the library director who manages day to day operations. They also help to write policies and develop the strategic plan that guides the library's future, they set and approve a budget and expenses, and they advocate for our library within the community and beyond.

The advocacy and budgeting duties of our trustees are more important than ever as of a result of 2023 property tax reform legislation at the state level. To understand exactly why, we need to take a look at our local library levy, and how recent legislation has impacted it.

Our community came together in the 1970's in support of our local library, and to preserve its funding, by voting to approve a local tax levy. This levy specifically provided for funds from all Burlington residents to be designated toward the operation of our library. During the 2023 legislative season, our state legislators passed House File 718, with the goal of reforming property tax. One of the consequences of HF 718 was that it limited the ability of cities to implement these local levies that would allow them to fund important components of their local communities. The impact to libraries across the state was significant, with 97 libraries losing their levies as a direct result of HF 718.

While operational costs continue to rise, the state has effectively cut one of our sources of funding, leaving our trustees, director, and city working together to find viable solutions to preserve our operating budget. You may have seen our trustees at city council meetings and may hear from them in the coming days and weeks providing education and awareness on what we can do to continue to support our library during these tough budgetary times.

This should serve as an important reminder to all of us that elections – city, state, and federal – impact us here in Burlington, and our engagement with our legislators is more important now than ever. As always, the most important way you can support our library is to use it, and to help us tell our story in the community.
