In going to City Hall and the Capitol at Des Moines to advocate for the Burlington Public Library, I have been telling our story and showcasing how something as traditional as a public library is a thriving community center in this digital age. 140 years ago, when the City of Burlington voted in Ordinance 21 shifting our private library into a public one, information was very static. New discoveries, ideas, and ideations were relegated to the pages of a print document. Libraries were born out of this age as an economical way to have access to these discoveries, ideas, and ideations. This is how humanity progressed at such a rapid rate. We found the loophole to evolutionary limits by recording and consolidating information into bound books, pamphlets, and the like which allowed us to quickly learn from the discoveries of those who came before us and build upon them. No longer did people need to individually attempt to figure out how to control fire, as early peoples did; we can read and learn about the amazing ways to harness energy and heat and build upon them. This is how we went from oral communication in 100,000BCE to cave paintings in 30,000BCE to landline phones in 1876 to being able to make video calls with the International Space Station in 2025. For hundreds of thousands of years information moved at a glacial pace, and in the last 150 years we have seen mind-blowing progress, and during that time the Burlington Public Library has remained a relevant and reliable resource for access to information. Burlington produced great minds like Brian Metzger who figured out where in the universe gold came from, Bart Howard who serenaded us with romanticized space travel, and Ed Stone who took humanity beyond the Moon to Mars. These men relied upon access to heaps of information in order to go down in the history books as award-winning thinkers, and their discoveries and creations will in turn be used to inspire and launch the next round of human progress. As information has become more valuable in our fast-paced world, so too have libraries. As we continue to request fair and decent funding and legislation for our library, I take great pride in knowing that throughout humanity's great leap forward we have been right there at the leading edge connecting, inspiring, and learning with the best of them.

Current law allowed married women to be placed in asylums by their husbands without the benefit of a formal trial or medical examination. Elizabeth started a campaign to change that unjust law. Hear from Elizabeth Packard in April 1864, while the Civil War rages around the nation, and her private war is raging in her soul.
